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






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Important plans for the year ahead



appy summer everyone. By the time you read this in the summer edition of Water Matters almost two months will have passed since our Section Conference in Tacoma. It's hard to believe May 2019 was our last in-person conference prior to Tacoma. It was so energizing and good for the soul to see our membership in person again after three long years. However, I must admit, I forgot how exhausting it is to put on real clothes and engage in face-to-face conversations all... day... long. I joked with some co-workers during the conference about crawling into a deep dark hole after the conference to decompress. I'm an introvert at heart and that hole was calling my name.

The 2022 Section Conference had a new format so most of you didn't get to hear my Chair acceptance speech at the Board of Trustees meeting on Friday afternoon. I'm so thankful I did not have to eat my dinner on a stage or give my speech in front of hundreds of people. For those of you that missed my Chair acceptance speech, it is provided below with some minor tweaks (i.e., no silly tears or silly jokes). Yep, that's right, I cried during my speech. Let's just say I cry when I'm happy and passionate about something.

I'm so incredibly honored and stoked, and a wee-bit nervous, about leading our Section over the next year. During the conference, I had a few people ask me what I'd like to accomplish over the next year. My answer was I have a lot of ideas, but they currently lack a solid plan. In addition

to promising to put forth my best self over the next year, here are a few areas where I would like to focus the Section's efforts over the next year.

Financial stability

Jason Canady shared his Treasurer's Report at the Trustees meeting. The Section Conference is the largest source of income and largest expense for the Section. Cancelling two in-person conferences definitely had an impact on our Section's finances and we will likely be recovering from these impacts for another year or two. However, as Jason highlighted in his report, our proactive management and ability to shift to a virtual conference and other virtual training events has resulted in a financial position that is stronger than I think many of us expected. We can't hit the gas pedal too hard just yet, though. We will need to continue to be conservative in our budget development and spending until we fully recover from the impacts of COVID, and this may mean making more hard choices about what is funded over the next couple of years.

Diversity and inclusion

In the Summer of 2020, under Past-Chair Ronda Farmer's leadership, the Section established the Diversity and Inclusion Subcommittee as part of the Membership Engagement and Development Committee. The Subcommittee was established to help the Section further the mission of AWWA's Diversity and Member Inclusion

Committee. The Subcommittee has been hard at work under Esther Chang's leadership and hosted an excellent track at the Section Conference focused on diversity and inclusion.

One of the first activities of the Subcommittee was a diversity and inclusion survey to better understand the diversity and makeup of our Section and identify areas of improvement to promote an inclusive environment. The initial survey was distributed between April and June of 2021 with a plan to repeat the survey every year. Last year's survey only had 32 participants out of 2000+ members, so I'm challenging our membership to significantly improve participation this year. A QR code for the 2022 survey is provided below. The survey is anonymous and closes on September 2, 2022. Survey participants will be entered into a raffle to win one of two \$25 e-gift cards and a homemade pasta dinner with me at my home. I encourage you to participate in this survey as the results will inform recruiting and retention efforts and you can win a cool prize.

The Subcommittee also developed several recommendations and areas of improvement for the Board, Committee, and Subsection leaders. I'd like to see us make some more progress to support those recommendations. The Board of Trustees recently adopted changes to the Rules of Procedure which include many important updates and additions including a Commitment to Diversity and Inclusion. I would like to take this commitment one step further by incorporating a diversity and inclusion objective into the Section's Strategic Plan.

One of the Subcommittee's other recommendations was to consider supporting more focused outreach for minorities as well as high schools, paired with mentorship programs



specific to marginalized groups. I love this idea for a few reasons. One – it introduces students early to the water industry and the wide variety of career opportunities available; two – I think it will help build trust in the water industry. My project work at the Portland Water Bureau includes working with our Community Engagement Liaisons (CEL program) and through that work I've been reminded of differing cultural beliefs around tap water and the safety of tap water. Through engagement of students from different cultural backgrounds and minority groups, I'm hoping we can help build their trust and confidence. Three – it introduces students to our organization and the fun and fulfillment that comes with volunteering which may lead to careers in the water industry and future membership. Our visiting dignitary Angela Ballard-Landers shared some of these same sentiments at the Trustees meeting so I believe this is an important part of our work going forward.

Networking diversity

While on the topic of diversity, I would also like to promote more diversity in our networking activities. As some of you know, I despise golf, but golf and wine and beer drinking are the two activities that make up most of our networking and fundraising events. I certainly appreciate the skills required to play golf, but I do not naturally possess those skills (much to my father's dismay) and I am not willing to spend time honing those skills. I also appreciate and enjoy the wine and beer drinking but I am committing to creating at least one networking event that does not revolve around golf, wine, or beer. I read on AWWA's website that WaterOne in Johnson City, Kansas, throws the Tower 2 Tower 5K as part of Drinking Water Week. Runners follow a course that loops between two local water towers and proceeds go to Water For People. I thought this was a fantastic idea except for the running part, because I also hate running. So maybe it is something different like amateur ski/snowboard (or maybe sled) races, a hiking or mountain biking event, a volunteer opportunity, or maybe some putt putt or water themed bingo.

Finally, I would like to express my sincerest gratitude to John Roth and Ronda Farmer for their leadership over the past two years. We have been operating in unknown territory the past couple of years and they both navigated it seamlessly. Updating the Bylaws and Rules of Procedure was a huge accomplishment and Ronda and John lead us through this mundane but necessary process with enthusiasm. They have been such great leaders and mentors and will be a tough act to follow. Ronda and John missed out on their chair receptions at the Section Conference, but next time you see them please give them a belated congratulations and thank them for their hard work.

It was so awesome to be back to "normal" for our conference and seeing everyone in person. Thanks to all of you for the time you commit to this organization and the great work you do. 🖎

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


Diversity & Inclusion (D&I) Subcommittee

PNWS inaugural Diversity and Inclusion award



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Scholarship Committee

The Pacific Northwest Section began providing scholarships in 1971. The Section Board formally established the Education and Training (E&T) fund in 1985 to help provide a stable funding base for these scholarships. Since 1995, the Section has awarded over \$742,000 in scholarships to 316 students. A solid, conservative investment strategy, supported and enhanced by ongoing legacy and direct contributions from PNW individuals and Subsections, has built a strong scholarship fund.

This year E&T proceeds augmented by direct contributions from the NW Washington Subsection, Kelman Publishing (our Newsletter publisher), and One Operator matching funds given by the NW Washington Subsection and One Operator National, enabled the committee to award a total of \$51,500 to eleven scholarship recipients. In addition to this, \$12,000 was reserved for Short School scholarships. The total available education and training funding this year was \$63,500. We celebrated these awards and marked this progress at our 2022 Annual Spring Conference in April.

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

2022 Excellence in Engineering award winners

The PNWS-AWWA Engineering Committee is thrilled to be able to announce the 2022 Excellence in Engineering award winners. These awards recognize excellence in engineering for water supply, treatment, or conveyance projects. For the awards this year, the judges were looking for projects which incorporated innovate technology, overcame difficult challenges, included sustainable elements, and considered system resilience.

As in year's past, the award was given in three different project categories: Engineering Planning, Small Projects (<\$5M construction), and Large Projects (>\$5M construction). Congratulations to this year's winners!

Engineering Planning

City of Keizer Risk and Resilience Assessment

Project Owner: City of Keizer

Project Engineer: 4B Engineering and Consulting

Description: Keizer's water system consists of 17 wells and supplies water to approximately 38,000 people without using disinfection processes or substantial water storage. The risk and resilience assessment looked at the city's overall water system to evaluate various risks including cyberterrorism, biothreats, natural hazards, and operation malfunctions. This important planning study helped to prioritize these risks in terms of severity, cost, and probability of failure. The results of this study will lead to improvements in reliability and resilience for the city of Keizer.

Small Projects

Olympic Water and Sewer Groundwater Chlorination and Filtration Facilities

Project Owner: Olympic Water and Sewer Inc. (OWSI)

Project Engineer: HDR

Description: For decades OWSI operated their system as an unchlorinated water supply. However, in 2018 persistent total coliform detections began to appear in their Zone B pressure system. When a comprehensive system investigation couldn't pinpoint a specific source of contamination, HDR and OWSI made the decision to install chlorine storage, feed, and monitoring systems at all five of their wells. Because of high levels of manganese in the well water, the addition of chlorine also required the renovation and addition of new greensand filters to address concerns of discolored water. Despite numerous challenges, the team was able to successfully establish design requirements, secure project funding, and address multiple water quality issues for the system.

Constructed Cost: \$1.7 Million

Large Projects

Cherry Crest Pump Station Project Owner: City of Bellevue

Project Engineer: Murraysmith

Description: In 2016, Murraysmith began working with the City of Bellevue to provide an alternatives analysis for replacing the Pike's peak pump station. This study led to the idea of moving the Pikes pump pumping station to the Cherry Crest Park. The existing pump station at Cherry Crest was experiencing reliability problems and was also scheduled for upgrades in the coming years. This project became an opportunity to consolidated two water booster pump stations under a single roof. The new pump station serves three different pressure zones using six pumps with variable frequency drives. The process improvements of this project helped to save costs, improve pumping efficiency and simplify maintenance. Constructed Cost: \$6.5 Million

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


Creating a framework for effective risk management

Risk management is a core function executed by water utilities staff on many levels, whether or not it is a deliberate and well-defined part of the management activities. When done well, risk management supports interfaces across the enterprise and program/project levels by enhancing investment decision-making (including project prioritization), project implementation, organizational efficiency and effectiveness, safety, social equity, and achievement of community values.

Effective risk management typically includes establishment of a risk framework, which is an internal guidance document intended to help staff and consultants who are engaged with the risk or asset management work obtain a common understanding for management of risk within the broader context of the organization and its objectives. The framework seeks to standardize how the organization intends to identify, analyze, treat, and monitor/control risk in a repeatable fashion while meeting its regulatory obligations and community expectations. It can help staff understand the concepts of risk management and provide quidance to ensure consistent application of principles across the broader spectrum of the organization's resources (including assets), processes, and technology.



Fortunately, such a framework can be very simple and can bring risk management into the light.

Generally, the goal of a defined risk framework is to communicate three things: 1) why risk management is important, 2) how does the organization define terms used in risk management, and 3) general instructions regarding risk management activities at the

organization, including risk governance and interfaces across different organizational functions and responsibilities.

Many public sector infrastructureintensive organizations have defined a risk framework that defines and addresses risk in four separate and interrelated categories. These types of risk include Corporate, Project, Operational, and Asset. For each of these types of risk there are different ways to identify, analyze, treat, and monitor/control risks in a cyclical and repeatable process, as illustrated by the table on page 21.

The responsibilities for each of these stages of the risk management process commonly reside in different parts of the organization, depending on the category of risk. There are also four primary activities of risk management - identification, analysis,

The framework seeks to standardize how the organization intends to identify, analyze, treat, and monitor/control risk in a repeatable fashion while meeting its regulatory obligations and community expectations.

treatment, and monitor/control of risks, including threats (i.e., uncertain events with a negative impact) and opportunities (i.e., uncertain events with a positive impact).

When risk management is performed by applying industry best and effective practices, it is iterative in nature, drawing on new experiences and emphasizing learning, continual improvement, knowledge, and analysis for the revision of process elements, actions, and controls at each stage of the process. Risk-based decisionmaking ideally leans heavily on both staff knowledge in the context of the

organizational culture and objective data. When a risk management framework is employed with the overlay of data-driven analysis and decisionmaking, the results are demonstrably improved in terms of the organizational capability to achieve, and in many instances, exceed its objectives.



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

Zachary Hardwick – Spokane Water District #3

It was a very challenging year for the District. Not only the pandemic, but our field supervisor accepted a position with another utility to be closer to home, and we also suffered the unexpected death of one of our field crew that left us all on our heels. Zac stepped up and took over the supervision of the crew and was able to keep up with production while being short staffed. All while he was studying and passing his WDM 1 test. Although Zac has only two years in the water industry he has also mentored two new employees with no experience. He is truly a team player and an outstanding leader.

Greg Keith - City of Issaquah

As the City of Issaquah has grown from a small town of about 15,000 to that of over 40,000 since 1995, Greg Keith has been present and involved, guiding



the water department in the operation and maintenance of the of the water system expansion. Through this, he has upheld the highest standards in both the existing and new systems. With the addition of a surface water supply to supplement the City's groundwater

sources, there was a need to develop a blending and treatment station. Greg was there to guide the City through the planning, development, and construction process.

A landslide within the City required decisive action to ensure that hundreds of homes, in two separate pressure zones, would not be without water service. Greg developed an action plan to provide emergency water mains and establish distribution systems in response - maintaining the water supply until a permanent solution could be established. On the heal of this, the City was impacted by PFAS and had to develop a response plan to safeguard its residents - Greg was in the center of this effort.

In the face of the day to day demands of operating a water system, together with the immense challenges associated with explosive growth, natural disasters and groundwater contamination, Greg has remained focused, calm and determined to ensure that the water supply meets the demand and is safe to drink.

THE GEORGE WARREN **FULLER AWARD**

The highest award given by AWWA. It is bestowed on individuals for:

- distinguished service in the water supply field
- · brilliant diplomatic talent; and
- constructive leadership as characterized by the life and work of George Warren Fuller

Bob James - Washington State Department of Health



Bob James has spent over four decades serving the water profession and the public. Born in Spokane, his path to service in the water supply field was destined with his father and both grandfathers having successful and influential careers in waterworks. While he was born on the east side. he moved west and became a fervent Husky, earning his undergrad degree in Civil Engineering at UW. He started his career working for a small

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consulting firm in Spokane. Then in 1979, became a public servant with the Washington State Department of Health & Human Services (eventually renamed the Department of Health) with the Office of Drinking Water.

His passion and commitment to safe drinking water, public health, and good governance is unwavering. In his career, he has helped hundreds of communities with their drinking water supplies and built countless long-standing relationships. For over four decades, he has been a thought leader in his agency and invaluable mentor for hundreds of teammates and young professionals. He has positively impacted not just the drinking water industry, but his efforts have directly impacted most of the people of WA State.

He is a lifelong AWWA member and has been steadfast in support of subsection training events. A specific example: along with the Northwest Washington Subsection, he helped to pioneer the concept of a day-long workshop for regulators and utilities: "A Day with DOH". This workshop is now an annual event in many Subsections throughout Washington. He has provided tremendous support for his employees to be actively involved in AWWA with numerous members of his staff serving on committees from the subsection level to the national level. His support for his staff is unparalleled and most of them describe him as being willing to give the shirt off his back for them.

He was involved in the design-build regulatory process for most major treatment plants in the state (both SPU plants, Tacoma, and Everett) that serve about 80% of the state's population. His focus on public health and support for utilities has contributed to their day-to-day successes as well as emergency responses.

His lasting contribution is that he has taught multiple generations of Washington DOH staff that public health focus, compassion, good judgement, and long-term relationships are the ultimate tools to ensure safe and reliable drinking water. And circling back to what I mentioned earlier about those ancestors that were in the waterworks profession, his father,

Roger James received the Fuller award in 1975, and his grandfather, Alex Lindsay received the Fuller award in 1939.

LECHNER AWARD OF EXCELLENCE

The Lechner Award of Excellence is presented annually to recognize a Section Service Provider such as a vendor or consultant who has demonstrated exemplary service to the drinking water community and to AWWA's Mission and Goals. A.P. BLACK AWARD




Melinda Friedman -Confluence Engineering




While this award is presented annually at AWWA's Annual Conference and Exposition we


